HELLO TOMMY!

Let's have a look at how to use the following model auxiliary verbs:

*Should

*Would

We use both verbs for giving advice and making suggestions.

Let's begin with Should.

It is used for advising others in the present.



STRUCTURE

To make sentences using should...

You need

Subject + should + base verb



EXAMPLES

Here are some examples

1. You should go to work by car every day. It's more convenient!

2. You should start going to the gym.

3. She should study 10 new words every day.



DO NOT FORGET!

We can also use should for advice in the past.

Here is the structure:

Should + Have + Past Participle

- You should have called your brother last night.
- ·She should have studied more often.

NEGATIVE ADVICE



For negative advice, just put "not" after should in the sentence.

- ·You should not drink too much alcohol.
- You should not make fun of others.



The contraction is "shouldn't".

- You shouldn't drive too fast.
- •She shouldn't drive her car on rainy days.



WOULD

The modal verb "would" is used to give advice. If you want to give hypothetical advice as if you were the listener, use would.

EXAMPLES ARE:

- •If I were you, I would seek medical advice.
- •If I were you, I would not buy that car.

REMEMBER THESE TIPS

#1

It is not always necessary to include "If I were you."

•I wouldn't eat that.

I would choose red shoes.

It is also common to ask for advice using these modal verbs. Now, let's conclude by having a look at how to make questions using Would and Should.

You can use them to ask for advice.

Here are a couple of examples

- •What should I do?
- •What would you do?



Give me some Advice and suggestions!

I would like to go on a road trip.

Where should I go?

Where would you go if you were me?
